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for last-minute tours of the nearby islands, or even as far as Labuan. The terminal with its brilliant orange highlights has re-energised the look and feel of this location, with the spectacular South China Sea ahead, and the city behind you it is breathtaking.

At the main entrance, memories of Jesselton, the former name of this city has been preserved; you can view the city growth and development over time, from the numerous photographs some which date back to the early 1900s. There is a featured rail coach taken out from the existing North Borneo Railway service that serves as a drinking outlet called JP Train Station. There are other smaller cafés with affordable food and souvenir shops with a variety of interesting trinkets. For those of you into Futsal there are four world-class Futsal pitches, the first of its kind in the city using high-quality turf imported from Europe.

The real magic happens around and after sunset, the numerous cafes come alive, the informal outdoor alfresco dining experience; dinner under the stars is something you would want to have again and again. In time to come, but not long from now adjacent to Jesselton Point something very exciting is developing, a mega project named Jesselton Waterfront an undertaking by Suria Goup. A new waterfront city featuring exciting shopping, cafes, a maritime museum, apartments and five-star hotels - stay tuned for more information.
